For many of us who have lost a baby, and subsequently our dreams for that baby, telling the story is both healing and validating. "My baby was real! Her name was…" Our babies continue to be real. But in order to tell their stories, we might need visual aids. There are many ways to tell the stories. Here are a few simple suggestions:

Plant a tree or a bush.

Create a memorial garden stone.

Put together a scrap book or a shadow box.

Make a charitable contribution in your baby's name.

Create or order personalized jewelry with baby's name or birth stone.

Choose a "random acts of kindness" day. (Print up information cards to hand out.)

Display a wall hanging with baby's name.

Release balloons with baby's name or a written message.
